In "Theory and Practice", our Assistant Editor Peter Barry gives us some background and focus on what has to be the most dramatic of China's recent shifts in policy - the economic reforms. Peter follows the development of policy as it appeared in the *People's Daily* and other official publications.

Finally, we welcome back to our pages Lingman College Professor William Dockery who reviews Paul Cohen's Christian Missions and their Impact to 1900 (from The Cambridge History of China). He offers some fresh insights into missionary activity against the backdrop of modern Chinese history during the tumultuous 19th century.
