
A Special Remembrance for the 25th Anniversary of the Holy Spirit Study Centre

In 1980, Cardinal, then Bishop, John Baptist Wu, aware of the rapid changes taking place in the Mainland, realized that it was necessary to establish a link among Hong Kong, the Universal Church and Catholic brothers and sisters in Mainland China. In order to respond to their many needs, John Baptist Wu established the Holy Spirit Study Centre. Bishop Wu gave the Centre its role and function, its location and name. On the occasion of the Centre's 10th anniversary, Cardinal Wu summarized the purpose of the Centre with these words: "Build a bridge with our brothers and sisters inside and outside China, promoting the mission of reconciliation through the Gospel."

In 2005, various activities were held to celebrate the Centre's Silver Jubilee. We published a commemorative book "The Holy Spirit Study Centre 25th Anniversary. A Pictorial History." Sister Betty Ann Maheu, MM, was the author of the text, the collector of the pictures, and in one word the coordinator and editor of the whole book. She dedicated many weeks and long hours to the task. She was helped by other staff members and by our friend Ms. Moira



Shaw. The book, which can be requested from the Centre, is dedicated to the much beloved Cardinal John Baptist Wu. In the book, Sister Betty Ann introduced the bishops of Hong Kong, the

co-founders of the Centre: Fathers John Tong, Peter Barry, MM, Angelo Lazzarotto, PIME, and Elmer Wurth, MM; those who have served the Centre in the past 25 years, and those who are serving now. Then the history of the Centre and its multi-faceted service to the Church in China are illustrated through dozens of selected pictures, captions and texts.

This beautiful book of 80 pages is intended to be a simple gift to our friends throughout the world who have supported the Centre, to the various researchers who have worked here, to the members of the staff who have served with so much devotion throughout these 25 years, and to the many volunteers who graciously gave us a hand and helped lighten our work.

On November 17, 2005, the Centre celebrated a special Eucharist in the chapel of the Holy Spirit Seminary, presided over by Hong Kong Bishop Joseph Zen, to mark the anniversary. After the Mass, before numerous invited guests, Bp. Zen presented awards to the four co-founders of the Centre, and to four other members of the staff, in recognition of their long service and exceptional contribution to the Holy Spirit Study Centre.

The recipients were presented with a framed scroll, drawn by Fr. Edward Chau, who is known for his beautiful calligraphy. The text, written in Chinese characters, is taken from the famous "Hymn to Love" of the First Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians (chapter 13, verses 4-7). They were also presented with a special certificate with Bp. Zen's official *coat of arms*.

As a token of gratitude towards the eight recipients, we reproduce here the commendation read on that occasion for each one of them.

To Bishop John Tong, co-founder and long time director.

Bishop John Tong has been the soul and the head of the Centre

from the very beginning. His extensive knowledge of the situation

in China, his profound learning, united with great prudence and wisdom has gained him the respect and devotion of our brothers and sisters in China and all around the world. To Father Angelo S. Lazzarotto, PIME, co-founder and frequent contributor.
