Jerome Heyndrickx of China-Europe Institute in Louvain and Amitie-Chine of Canada have both agreed to edit some of our future issues. This opens the door for further expansion and development in the future.

With this 50th issue, <u>Tripod</u> seems to have arrived at something of a personal milestone. What more fitting time to share with our readers a brief review of our work during 1988.

One of our more successful projects has been our launching of a monthly supplement of news from China, which began to appear in the Kung Kao Po, Hong Kong's diocesan weekly newspaper in Zhu Ai Zhong Hua provides March. a steady stream of firsthand information and commentary on what is happening in the Church on the mainland. The news supplement is the work of Miss Teresa Yeung and part of her success can be measured by the number of enthusiastic letters she receives from readers locally, abroad and from the mainland itself. Kung Kao Po is also pleased to inform us that their subscriptions have increased since they began running the monthly supplement.

Our orientation and briefing sessions for overseas visitors to China have gained in popularity. We also continue to play host to Church groups within the Peoples' Republic who come to Hong Kong to inform themselves of what is happening on the local church scene here.

As Pentecost approaches, we become increasingly aware of our need to be open to the promptings of the Spirit that he might bring to fruition the work he has initiated and nurtures in all of us.
