Catholic Church Hierarchy in Hong Kong, 1841-1997

From 1841 until 1874 Hong Kong was a Prefecture with appointed Prefects Apostolic. In 1874, Rome raised Hong Kong to the status of a Vicariate Apostolic with appointed Vicars Apostolic. It was made a diocese on April 11, 1946.

1948

October 31: Bishop Henry Valtorta installed as first Bishop of the

Diocese of Hong Kong

1949

October 9: Fr. Lawrence Bianchi appointed Auxiliary Bishop of

Hong Kong.

1950

March 22: Bishop Bianchi and other Italian missionaries imprisoned

in Hoi Fung, presently in Guangdong Province. At that

Hoi Fung was part of the Hong Kong Diocese.

1951

September 3: Death of Bishop Valtorta.

1952

October 17: Bishop Bianchi released from Communist China. October 26:

Bishop Bianchi installed as second Bishop of Hong

Kong.

1967

July 1: Fr. Francis Hsu Chen-Ping appointed Auxiliary Bishop;

consecrated bishop on October 7.

December 19: Bishop Bianchi's resignation accepted. Bishop Hsu

appointed Apostolic Administrator.

1969

April: Bishop Bianchi returns to Italy. (He died on February 13,

1983).

Bishop Hsu appointed third bishop of Hong Kong May 29:

(installed on October 26). The direction of the Diocese

is handed over to the local clergy.

July 3: Fr. Peter Lei Wang-Kee appointed Auxiliary Bishop;

consecrated bishop on September 8.

1973

May 23: Death of Bishop Hsu.

December 21: Bishop Peter Lei appointed fourth Bishop of Hong Kong

and

installed on April 22.

July 23: Death of Bishop Lei. Fr. Gabriel Lam Cheuk Wai

elected Vicar-Capitular.

<u>1975</u>

April 5: Fr. John Baptist Wu Cheng-Chung appointed fifth

Bishop of Hong Kong; consecrated and installed on July

25.

<u> 1988</u>

May 14: Pope John Paul II nominates John Baptist Wu to the

College of Cardinals..

June 28 Bishop Wu made a Cardinal at the 1988 consistory.

<u>1996</u>

October 20: Father Joseph Zen, SDB, appointed co-adjutor bishop of

Hong Kong

Father John Tong Hon appointed auxiliary bishop of

Hong Kong.

December 9: Consecrations of Bishops Zen and Tong. (Cf. Below)
